In order to graduate from Northern Vermont University-Johnson with a Bachelor of Arts in Art, students must have a minimum of 120 credits (**33 credits hours at the 3000 or 4000 level must be from Northern Vermont University**). Students who graduate with an Associate Degree in Digital Media Production from the Community College of Vermont may enter the Bachelor of Arts in Art program. All college-level courses from CCV or other accredited institutions will be accepted by Northern Vermont University (non-credit courses and remedial/developmental courses will not be accepted) and applied where possible to the credits required to reach the 120 credits necessary to complete a bachelor's degree.
