Filling in the Gaps

During our Opening Convocation for the NVU-Johnson Class of 2023, Dr. Greg Petrics, Associate Professor of Mathematics spoke to the incoming class and greater NVU-Johnson community on *Filling in the Gaps: Don't Get Hacked*.

After welcoming the incoming class, Dr. Petrics noted how with limited information our brain is a "profound tool for filling in the gaps." He attributed this to our evolutionary need to react quickly and because information can be scarce. He then offered evidence as to how our brains can be hacked by showing examples such as optical illusions, political examples (propaganda), and in math. "Don't blame your brain. It's working hard and relentlessly fills in the gaps."

Dr. Petrics offered three rules to use to protect your brain from being hacked:

- 1. Zoom out. Work to see more.
- 2. Shift perspective. Work to see another's view.
- 3. Never stop pursuing truth. Work to illuminate facts.

He then ended with encouragement to the class and a bonus fourth rule.

Student Issues

If you feel that your student could use a little extra help while on campus, know there are many places for them to seek out supports. Please encourage your student to reach out to any of the following:

The **Advising Center** is where First-Year Academic Advising staff can be found. All new freshman have been assigned Cait Wilkins or Russ Weis as their advisor. They work with each incoming first year student to support integration with the campus community, connection with important resources (faculty, staff, and student resources), assist with degree planning & class registration, and engage in goal-setting discussions and activities. Transfer and Early College (EC) students work with Lizi Lyon (EC) or Brady Rainville (transfer/study away). The Advising and Registration Center is located in Dewey Hall, Room 158 or call (802) 635-1257.

The **Wellness Center** offers check-in consults, individual counseling, support groups, biofeedback, and light therapy. The Wellness Center is located on the lower level of Senators Hall, accessible by separate entrance on the outside perimeter of the building facing the road and parking lot.

The **Office of First-Year Experience** is a resource for students in their first year and well beyond. In addition to programming to help transition students to NVU-Johnson, FYE has a physical office on campus. Located in Dewey Hall, Room 164, students are encouraged to seek out this office as a first stop if there is ever uncertainty about where to turn with an issue or concern.
