In order to graduate from Northern Vermont University with a Bachelor of Science in Applied Psychology and Human Services, students must have a minimum of 120 credits (**33 credits hours at the 3000 or 4000 level must be from Northern Vermont University**). Students who graduate with an Associate Degree in Behavioral Science from the Community College of Vermont may enter the Bachelor of Science in Applied Psychology and Human Services program. All college-level courses from CCV or other accredited institutions will be accepted by Northern Vermont University (non-credit courses and remedial/developmental courses will not be accepted) and applied where possible to the credits required to reach the 120 credits necessary to complete a bachelor's degree.
