Additional Credits to reach 120 (may include general electives and general education courses as needed to meet degree requirements)
In order to graduate from Northern Vermont University with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice, students must have a minimum of 120 credits (33 credits hours at the 3000 or 4000 level must be from Northern Vermont University). Students who graduate with an Associate Degree in Criminal Justice from the Community College of Vermont may enter the Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice program. All college-level courses from CCV or other accredited institutions will be accepted by Northern Vermont University (non-credit courses and remedial/developmental courses will not be accepted) and applied where possible to the credits required to reach the 120 credits necessary to complete a bachelor's degree.
