

Many of the issues of racism, anti-war movements, and generational gaps of understanding and empathy still ring true in our society today. Our production ties direct links between these social movements of the sixties and our contemporary ones: Occupy Wall Street, Black Lives Matter, and LGBTQ+ equality.
