Although many colleges may not use the SAT to evaluate your application, scholarship foundations will still use the SAT as a way decide who to award their scholarship money to.

One of the most important things that you will do this Spring is prepare for the SAT. Our SAT prep. is one of the very best things UB offers, and we expect all of our juniors will be in attendance for this event. This one day prepara-

tion will make a huge impact on your college portfolio. This will also be the first meeting in which we will talk to all of our juniors as rising seniors...kind of a scary thought, isn't it?

At this meeting, we will give you an overview of what to expect this summer, lay out your entire senior year, and make sure that you are heading in the right direction. Then, our teachers will refresh you on what you learned this summer and remind you of all of the techniques that will help you maximize your score. As always, we will feed you at the end of the night and have snacks for you as we begin the day.

Remember, you are still better prepared for the SAT than almost every other student in Vermont. Our official SAT scores are 120 points higher than the National Average and almost 249 points above the average for TRIO eligible students! As a Dell Scholar, Kai will receive a total of \$20,000 awarded over four years. Additionally, Kai will receive comprehensive academic, financial, and emotional support from the program, access to an extensive Schol-



ars Resource Network, access to a teletherapy service, a laptop, and annual Chegg credits to be used to attain textbooks. Kai is the exact student that the Dell Scholar's Program seeks to serve. Amber Wolf Named NEOA Rising Star

Amber Wolf was recently awarded the New England Educational Opportunity Association (NEOA) Rising Star Award for her academic achievements to date, and participation in the TRIO Upward Bound program. The NEOA Rising Star Award honors emerging leaders who strive toward the highest levels of personal and professional accomplishment, who excel in their chosen field, devote time and energy to their community in a meaningful way, and serve as a role model for other low income, first generation, and college bound students and students with disabilities. Amber was a member of the Upward Bound program at Northern Vermont University – Lyndon.

Amber went on to attend the College of the Atlantic (COA): a very small, private, liberal arts college in Bar Harbor Maine that specializes in Human Ecology. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Human Ecology with concentrations in Biology, Molecular Genetics, Botany, Conservation, and Wildlife Ecology. She was extraordinarily successful and involved during

her four years there: interning with the MDI Biological Laboratory, fulfilling the role as a Resident Advisor for three years, accepting positions as a Teacher's Assistant (TA) for five semesters, partaking in many research projects, working as a Mental Health Support Group Facilitator, and staying involved in all aspects of community life at COA.

Bernie Sanders and Elly Bliss

On the evening of March, 15th, Senator Bernie Sanders hosted a virtual Town Hall for students from across the state of Vermont. This event offered nine local High School students the extraordinary opportunity to participate in a panel and voice their opinions and concerns about the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on their educational experience, mental, social, and emotional health, finances and more. Additionally, Senator Sanders wanted to hear student's innovative ideas on how to ensure a better delivery of education and ways to promote positive mental health.

Career Exploration

At this point in your high school career, you may not be sure what you want to study when you get to college. Besides, that's three years from now! It is okay for you to be undecided at the moment, but you should certainly be conducting some career exploration in your free time. After all, you will never know what you want to study if you do not do the research to figure it out! Here are some ways that you can start exploring careers:

• Take a Personality Test - it makes a lot of sense when you think about it, but people with certain personalities are naturally drawn to certain career paths. So, take a few minutes to take a few personality tests, such as the Holland Codes Assessment, and figure out what sorts of careers your personality best aligns with. From there, you can dive deeper into researching the careers that sound most interesting to you.



• **Research!** - Once you have completed your personality test and you have found a few careers that interest you, research them! Websites such as **The Bureau of Labor Statistics** and **O*Net** have complied informational videos and statistics on the various careers that exist. Watch those videos and read the statistics to find out what the median salary is, what the typical daily activities are, and what sort of educational background and licensing you may need to achieve. This will help you see if this career would really be a good fit for you!

• **Exploration** - Through the Upward Bound summer program, you will be able to experience job shadowing. If you have found a career that you are incredibly interested in and want to learn more about, let us know! We will be able to set you up at a job site this summer that reflects your interests. Interested in medicine or nursing? We can set you up at the local hospital! And, if you know anyone currently working in the field, reach out to them and ask them how they like what they do!

If you need any further assistance in your career exploration journey, never hesitate to reach out to us! We are happy to help! Oh, and be sure to read the newsletter each month! There is always a career spotlight included.

While You're Looking, Check This Career Out! Clinical Laboratory Science/Medical Technology

According to SUNY Plattsburg:

"Medical technologists (a.k.a. clinical laboratory scientists) are board-certified, licensed professionals who analyze clinical samples (body fluids, specimens, infectious agents), usually in a hospital or clinical laboratory. Doctors rely on this work, as 75% of medical diagnoses are made based on clinical lab tests performed by medical technologists".

This is a medical and science based course of study and career path. This field may be right for you if:

- You love (and are good at) science! Specifically if you are strong in chemistry, biology, and physiology.
- You are extremely detail-oriented and capable of compiling important data accurately.
- You don't mind repetition. This is a job that will require you to work in a lab and do the same thing—repeatedly.
- You don't mind working behind the scenes. You won't have much patient interaction in this field.

If any of this sounds interesting to you, you can check out the programs at SUNY Plattsburgh, the University of Rochester, Stony Brook University, and the University of Vermont (just to name a few!).

How <u>YOU</u> Benefit from Volunteering



At the completion of your time with Upward Bound you will have completed over 300 hours of Community Service. This Community Service will be a great addition to your resumes and will impress the colleges that you apply for, but that is not the only reason that we have you participate in it. Here are some other reasons that you should be participating in Community Service:



- 1. You Gain New Skills: Each volunteer opportunity that you participate in will require training to some extent. This training will teach you new, professional skills, which will further help prepare you for college and your future career. These skills can span from learning how to create and manage data spreadsheets to how to work with customers. Not to mention, you will walk away from this opportunity with valuable, hands-on work experience.
- 2. You Will Learn About Your Own Strengths: When you volunteer, you will complete a variety of different tasks and serve in a myriad of different roles—many that you have probably never experienced before. This is a great way for you to learn what you enjoy doing, but also to learn more about your own strengths and weaknesses. For example, you may learn that you perform well in stressful situations, that you are a strong leader, or that you have a knack for communicating with large groups of people. Learning about these strengths and weaknesses can better help you decide on the right major and career for you.
- **3. It is a Cultural Learning Experience:** When you volunteer at Community Service events, you are most likely going to be working to assist those in need. This experience can help to open your eyes to the reality and struggles of the community around you, and how you can make a positive impact. This can foster a sense of compassion and understanding in you that is priceless. It may even help you to realize that your life calling lies in the Public Service sector.



4. It is Good for Your Health!: Multiple studies have proven that volunteering can have a positive effect on your mental and physical health. Getting involved in Community Service can help increase your physical activity—some opportunities may require you to complete some form of manual labor, such as raking, moving boxes, etc. The positive impact that volunteering can have on your mental health has been referred to as "helper's high". This happens because volunteering can help you to gain a sense of purpose and accomplishment, and to help you feel more satisfied with life.



5. And, it Will Help You Get Scholarships: Colleges and scholarship organizations alike are looking for students who play an active role in their community. There are plenty of merit-based scholarships out there, but there are many different character-based scholarships available to those students who have committed a significant amount of their free time to helping others and their community. So, help yourself to make college more affordable by helping others!

Seniors—More to Think About!

Seniors and Parents: Be Aware of Your Total College Cost!

Please, please, please be aware of what each of your colleges will cost for you to attend! Unfortunately we have seen some terrible award letters from colleges throughout New England. And if you are a parent of a senior you realize that no two award letters even have the same information on them! We have seen award letters that look great at first—but then we see a \$25,000 parent loan embedded in the award!

When we see an award letter in our office, we look at the cost of the college and take away all free money—grants and scholarships— and then look at what the total is for a family to pay. When this gets above \$8,000—\$9,000 we start to get worried. Our recommendation is that no student should be

borrowing more than they will earn in their first year out of college. Students have to be very careful about the amount of money they are borrowing. College loans do not go away—even if a student declares

bankruptcy. And an even more scary thought is that every Upward Bound student who has borrowed an excessive amount to fund their college education has dropped out of college!

Our goal in Upward Bound is make sure a family is not buried in loan debt. I have heard some families say they will not help to support their child's education. The results maybe that that child borrows so much that they cannot pay it back! Upward Bound students need to make good choices and be good consumers, and not just make decisions based on what they want! Being an adult is hard....but being a poor adult is even harder!

College Cost!

All of you have heard me talk about this in the past. I really am not concerned about how much any of your colleges cost, but I am concerned how much <u>you pay</u> for college! Although there are some schools that are more than \$70,000, very few Upward Bound students pay this amount—just ask Becky Doucet! As you have seen during senior seminar and at our Senior Meeting with your parents, some schools that initially look less expensive ultimately end up costing more. The worksheets that we did with you last summer help you and your family lay out the real cost of any school that you are looking at. What we need to do is to look at the grants and scholarships (free money) that you are being offered, look at loans which you


will pay back and they add in work study which you do not receive until after you find a job! We want to know what the bottom line is... how much a college will cost you each year—for four years! For every students who has sent us there award letters with have created a graph that shows exactly how much their college will cost the family. Ask your young scholars to show it to you!

Award Letters

Please fax or email us a copy of <u>every</u> award letter you receive. Every Award letter gives us a better idea of college admissions in New England and helps us to advise future Upward Bound students. We will evaluate and offer advice to you after reviewing each and every one. From past experience we expect to see a huge variation between schools. We will let you know what we think and advocate for you as appropriate.

Many of you have been outstanding with this! We have almost 60 award letters in our office right now! Upward Bound students will be thanking you for years!

But the person who scored well on an SAT will not necessarily be the best doctor or the best lawyer or the best businessman. These tests do not measure character, leadership, creativity, perseverance.







Attention New Hampshire Seniors!

If you have not already, now is the time to fill out and submit your application for the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation! All applications are due by April 16th, but we encourage you to submit them a week in advance of the deadline. Reminder, this application is only for students who reside in New Hampshire. Blue Mountain and Rivendell Students are eligible for the \$20,000 Gilman Scholarship!

The New Hampshire Charitable Foundation

April 16th

NHCF is the largest provider of publicly available scholarships in New Hampshire, awarding more than \$5.5 million to 1,500 promising students each year. The 383 scholarship funds at the Foundation were created by generous donors who wanted to help the next generation of New Hampshire students reach their full potential.



New Hampshire students apply using *ScholarshipSource* as a single unified scholarship application. The deadline for our New Hampshire Upward Bound students is April 16th by 5:00pm. But I warn you-I would try to get my application to the NHCF a week ahead of time to allow for school or computer issues.



Scholarships You Need to be Working ON!

VT EPSCoR:

April 1st The VT EPSCoR Center for Workforce Development and Diversity (CWDD) works to cultivate and prepare a diverse science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) workforce in Vermont by inspiring students to enter STEM careers. As part of their work they will award \$5,000 scholarships to Native American (including Abenaki) and First Generation college students who enter STEM majors at a Vermont college or university. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic standing, letters of recommendation, and an essay detailing career goals. This is the one I emailed you about in December....take some time if you are eligible!

One last reminder about this years Phillips Scholarship. If you plan on applying for this remarkable scholarship, you need to send me a copy of your essays and you need to set up a meeting with me between April 4th — 14th, or sooner—to discuss your application. When we meet, we will look very closely at your eligibility for the scholarship, the award letter you are using and the highlights of your application. Before Upward Bound starts the recommendation we need to evaluate your completed written essays so we can tailor our part of the application! This is very different from what we have done in the past. - Have a GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale
- Be enrolled in a demanding course of study
- Demonstrate skilled writing

Career Spotlight

Engineering

Engineering is an incredibly popular educational and career path for students in the 21st century. However, it is important to understand that the term "engineering" covers a broad range of different career paths. Students interested in engineering can choose from branches such as Biomedical, Plastics, Mechanical, Civil, Agricultural, Chemical, Aerospace, Computer, Electrical, Software, and so much more. Each branch of engineering has a completely different focus. For example, Biomedical Engineers research and develop machinery and practices that help advance the medical field.

Students who are interested in pursuing engineering can choose to pursue an associate's, bachelor's, or graduate level degree:

Associate's Degree: These two-year programs involve a rigorous course of study with focuses on math, science, and engineering technology. This level of degree can prepare students for careers in civil, electrical, industrial, chemical, and/or mechanical engineering. Graduates can anticipate a median salary of \$60,000.

Bachelor's Degree: This is the most commonly sought after degree by students interested in engineering. This level of education will require students to take a very rigorous course load but will allow for students to specialize in any field of engineering, including biomedical, plastics, computer, civil, architectural, etc. Graduates can anticipate a median salary of \$70,000.


Master's and PhD: This is the highest level of education that students can pursue. This level will allow students to further specialize and expand upon their bachelor's level studies. Graduates from this level of study can anticipate a median salary of \$80,000—\$100,000.

David Moody from Craftsbury, Vermont was recently nominated for the U.S Presidential Scholar's program. The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, by executive order of the President, to recognize and honor some of our nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. It has since been extended to recognize students who demonstrate exceptional talent in the visual, creative and performing arts, and students who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in career and technical education fields. Each year, approximately 4,000 students are nominated on a state by state basis primarily based on SAT and ACT scores. Up to 161 students are named as Presidential Scholars each year, one of the nation's highest honors for high school students.

David Moody attended Craftsbury Academy for the majority of his High School career, taking the most difficult classes available to him and challenging himself to go above and beyond traditional academics. When he completed Craftsbury's math curriculum by sophomore year, David was able to take and successfully complete calculus three online through the University of Vermont. David's hard work and success at Craftsbury is what ultimately lead to David's acceptance to Clarkson's early college program where he is currently enrolled in his second semester. David has also been a part of the Lyndon Upward Bound program hosted out of Northern Vermont University for the past three years. Upward Bound is one of the federally funded TRIO educational opportunity programs, and students come from modest-income backgrounds and are often the first in their families to attend college. David was fully engaged in this program: volunteering over 70 hours at the Fairbanks Museum in Saint Johnsbury, VT, attending a STEM summit in Plattsburg, NY, the annual Green Mountain Scholar's Bowl held at UVM in 2019, and was one of 8 Lyndon Upward Bound students selected to attend the 2019 JFK Leadership Conference in Boston.

What sets David apart from his peers is his exceptionally inquisitive mind, deep passion for learning and creating, and overall hardworking and driven character. He is naturally curious about how things work, and really enjoys taking apart electronics and putting them back together. David also really enjoys building and reconfiguring model airplanes, often adding modifications to observe how it affects the plane's speed, aerodynamics, and handling. It is this passion that drives David to pursue a career in engineering. An exceptional young scholar: full of wonder, curiosity, and optimism, David truly has the mind of an Engineer.

In his free time David also really enjoys cross country skiing and was part of Craftsbury's Cross Country team during his time there. He was also part of Craftsubry's soccer and ultimate Frisbee teams. He has also been very involved in Nordic Skiing and band, and participated in the Craftsbury's theater production as a freshman. One of the qualities that makes David such a special student is his drive and ambition to try new things and develop a wide array of skillsets.
