The QuestBridge Program

The QuestBridge Program is an opportunity that several of our students have participated in the PAST. This program helps to match our best students with the nation's best colleges and, more importantly, helps you to excel at the best college fit for you. **Mara**

Duquette was a Questbridge Scholar last year and she matched with the University of Chicago. Although it is almost identical to what we do at Upward Bound, their college match program is something that we cannot offer. The colleges they affiliate with are the *best colleges in the nation and also offer full scholar-ships if you can get in!* Please understand that I would rather have you with us during the summer, but I am also committed to supporting academic opportunities like this to get you where you want to be. And even if you attend Questbridge – we will continue to work with you until College Graduation! If you are interested in this, please look at the information below and talk with us.

To be eligible to apply for the scholarship you have to be a junior and intend to pursue your college studies at one of the top colleges in United States. **The applicant should:**

- be facing economic challenges and demonstrate the academic potential to attend top colleges,
- applicant should get primarily A's in the most challenging courses available,
- strong writing ability, and motivation to succeed,
- the applicant should be ranked in the top 5-10% of their class and must score greater than 1280 on the SAT or PSAT, or greater than 27 on the ACT.

**March 21, 2021* is the deadline to apply for the QuestBridge College Prep Scholarship program. Interested and eligible candidates should apply before the deadline. For further information please visit the official website at <u>www.questbridge.org/</u>

TRIO Day Conference 2021

We are so proud of the students who attended this year's first ever virtual TRIO Day conference. We know how busy most of you are, and the last thing you want to do is join another ZOOM meeting, but you all really took advantage of this opportunity to develop professionally and academically, explore new opportunities, gain insight and inspiration from speakers and workshop hosts, and ask important questions that will help you better navigate your path to college. For the rest of you— you really missed out! TRIO Day is a free opportunity to become better prepared for your future and this year we made it easy for you - you didn't even need to leave your couch! Just ask **Chelsea Ott** how much she learned at TRIO Day after attending every sin-



gle session... she even used the "mind blown" emoji... twice! Expect a little goody basket at your doorstep if you participated! :)

Overall we had 18 of our students participate in at least one of the TRIO Day events. Of the 18, we saw 8 students for more than one of the three days, and 8 students attended Dr. Anthony Jack's Keynote speech... along with our very own **Rebecca Doucet!** It was a very well put together three day event. The theme for Tuesday was "Community" which kicked off the workshop nicely with a community service panel focused on growth through giving back. Students then broke out into workshops with the themes: community connection, networking, goal setting, finding community in a pandemic, and turning service into money. Wednesday was Education day which began with admissions roundtables where students were able to choose which schools they wanted to learn more about and ask valuable questions from admissions officers and current students. From there students moved into an "industry meet and greet" where they got the opportunity to chat with professionals from a field of choice, and ended with a TRIO alumni panel. Thursday wrapped up the event with theme of "Advocacy" and featured a conversation panel with the Maine Congressman, Advocacy workshops including: finding an internship, organizing your e-mail, and asking for help, and the Keynote address from Dr. Anthony



Having a Hard Time Studying? Try Something New!

Studying can be a tedious task that, when you don't have a tried and true method, can feel impossible and pointless! That being said, studying is an incredibly important thing for you to be doing to ensure that you are achieving the best grade possible. It is a skill that you should work on building now so that you will be prepared once you get to college! If your current methods for studying are just not working, take a peak at these tips and tricks:

Give the Study Cycle a Try

If you are spending hours the night before a big test trying to cram all of your notes into your brain, you are studying wrong! The Study Cycle, which was developed by Frank Christ, demonstrates how studying should be a process which is accomplished over a period of time. If you follow the cycle, you will learn how to gain the most from your classes and the notes you take and learn how to best fill gaps in your leaning. One last thing! The cycle is a cycle for a reason—it is meant to be completed over and over, as many times as you need, ensuring that you fully understand the concept you are working on. Check out the graphic to the right and give the cycle a try!



Practice, practice, practice!

Repetition is key. The more you hear, read, or learn about something, the better the chance that you will retain it. Musicians and athletes alike can testify to this! Studies have proven that if students retake the same practice test numerous times over a period of days or weeks, they are likely to achieve a whole letter grade more then if they study just once. So, break out those flash cards or practice tests and start quizzing yourself. Then do it again tomorrow, and the next day, and then again on Friday!



Shake Things Up

It is so easy to fall into a rut when you are studying. Shake things up as much as you can—this will help keep you focused and on task and will also help you to find the best method for studying for you! Use flashcards, but also reread your notes, and have a friend test you. If you're studying a foreign language, stick labels to objects around your house! Also, change your setting! If you find studying in your bedroom to be challenging, move to your living room or outside, even try the library or a Dunkin! Our surroundings can have a serious impact on our ability to learn—find the right one for you.

Try pictures!

For certain subjects, seeing is knowing! Do not be afraid to use visuals and graphs to help commit the concept to your memory. For foreign languages, including a picture along with the vocabulary word can dramatically change your ability to remember the answer. Diagrams for remembering parts of the brain or countries in Europe can be essential in helping you to remember your test material.

Be kind to yourself

It isn't healthy or helpful to cram the night before a major test, so plan ahead. Your brain and grades will thank you for it later. Space out your study sessions, plan breaks for snacks and fresh air, and try to make studying enjoyable and worthwhile! Everyone learns different, so take the time to try different methods for studying, one is bound to stick. The better you get at studying now, the easier it will be in the fu-



ture. And if you are still having a difficult time, don't be afraid to ask for help! Your teachers, parents, guidance counselors, and even your trusty UB staff may be able to help.

Junior Discover Essay's and Matrixes



We want to start by saying "**thank you**" to all of you who worked hard on your Junior Essays, Discover Essays and Matrixes and got them to us in a timely manner. We really enjoyed reading through all of them and getting a better idea of what all of you are thinking in regards to college. These documents provide us with important perspective so that we can better serve you!

At this point, you should have met with one of us to discuss your essays and matrix. If you have not done this already, please reach out to us ASAP to schedule a meeting!

Remember—this is the beginning of a multi-step journey to creating essays that can be submitted alongside your college applications. The more you work on them between now and next fall, the better shape they will be in and the less last minute work you will have to do! Be sure that these essays truly reflect who you are and what you have to offer your choice universities. *And don't forget the "so what"*!

And, in regards to your matrixes, continue trying to build or refine your list. Remember, you should have a total of about 7 schools on your list including: 2-3 safety schools, 2-3 target colleges, and 1-2 reach schools. Do some research and attend our virtual college visits—this should help you get a better idea of what a "right fit" college looks like for you.

See the cartoon below? This is why you need viable colleges on your list! Safety schools that you will attend—not just to fill an Upward Bound requirement! There is money out there for you—but you just have to have the right colleges on your list! - Just Ask Evan....

So... what should I be doing?

Believe it or not you are on your way to college! In only a few short months you will be working through the common application for college and filing for financial aid. Anything you can do now to become better prepared is only going to make the fall easier for you. Below are some things you should be prioritizing:



Junior

- Editing your Discover Essays based on the feedback you received from Upward Bound.
- Researching colleges—both new ones and those that are already on your matrix!
- Attending Virtual Information Sessions and taking advantage of Virtual College Tours! UB has at least one Virtual Visit scheduled for every month—take advantage of these!
- Maintaining good grades and getting all of your school work done.



• Reading more and diverse literature! Read the newspaper, fiction and nonfiction literature, classic and contemporary reads, even our newspaper. Read more and read often.

- Stay active. Go for a walk when you can, come and snowshoe with UB... whatever you like to do to stay active, keep doing it!
- Take care of yourself! Prioritize sleep, nutrition, and self care whenever possible.



Grants vs Scholarships


Think way back to last summer when we talked about Grants and Scholarships! The most important thing you need to remember is that both grants and scholarships are free money for you! Grants are need based—on your families ability to pay for college—and scholarships are based on merit! But money from either source will help make the difference between a target and a reach school! You have all completed your grant applications (FAFSA and VSAC or NHCF)

Now is the crunch time to really shake those bushes for any scholarship money that you can find. By this point, hopefully, all of you have completed the VSAC Scholarship book and sent everything to Winooski! **Please make sure that you have exhausted your schools guidance department for all of the local scholarships that you are eligible for.** And please remember to look closely at all of the scholarships we send



your way—in particular the EPSCoR, the Gilman and the Phillips! These scholarships will be the ones that will help you to afford the college you most want to attend! If you do not apply for them you most likely will eliminate some very good schools!

A college scholarship may be renewable each year if all criteria has been met. In order to have the college scholarship renewed it is important to maintain the level of achievement the scholarship committee is requiring. Failure to do so may result in a loss of the college scholarship. Call us if you have questions.....



Look Closely at Each Award Letter!

Please remember to share each award letter with us! This will not only help you and your family make a good decision but it will also help all of the other Upward Bound students who are looking at schools similar to yours! After a college accepts you, you'll receive a letter outlining how much the school will cost and what kind of financial aid package you'll receive for one year. All financial aid award letters don't look the same, but they contain the same general information about grants, scholarships, work study, and loans! We have seen some great award letters and some that leave students looking for as much as

\$20,000 a year! After a college accepts you, you'll receive a letter outlining how much the school will cost and what kind of financial aid package you'll receive for one year. All financial aid award letters don't look the same, but they contain the same general information.

The biggest that we have seen so far is the amount of GAP that schools are listing! This remaining amount—or funding gap—is the amount that you will have to find through other sources! At some schools that funding gap maybe part of your Expected Family Contribution or it may not! And remember that your award letter is just for 1 year! If you have to borrow about \$10,000 a year—you will have to multiple that by 4 years!

Check Your Student Aid Report!

It is very important to have an accurate SAR. All of your financial aid awards are based on the information listed on the information your provided on the FAFSA

back in October! Please take some time right now to review it carefully with your family and compare the information listed to a copy of your FAFSA. The Expected Family Contribution (EFC) listed on your SAR will determine the amount of aid you'll receive. We have had a few students who had put down information that was not correct so you really need to take the time to look through the SAR to make sure you are getting all of the money that you are eligible for! If you think any of the information on your SAR is incorrect, correct it by going to the official **FAFSA website**.

Seniors Scholarships and Grants

VT EPSCoR: April 1st The VT EPSCoR Center for Workforce Development and Diversity (CWDD) works to cultivate and prepare a diverse science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) workforce in Vermont by inspiring students to enter STEM careers. As part of their work they will award \$5,000 scholarships to Native American (including Abenaki) and First Generation college students who enter STEM majors at a Vermont college or university. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic standing, letters of recommendation, and an essay detailing career goals. This is the one I emailed you about in December.....take some time if you are eligible! Just ask TC Daniel Cliché about this one! http://epscor.w3.uvm.edu/2/node/134

Stephen Phillips Memorial Scholarship: Early response applications due April 2nd, regular response applications due May 3rd. The Stephen Phillips Memorial Scholarship Fund offers renewable, 4-year scholarships to students with financial need who display:

- Academic achievement-good grades and a demanding, rigorous course load.
- Strong writing ability that demonstrates thoroughness and attention to detail. Much of your application will be judged on your essay!



- A strong "sense of other" as displayed through community service or family responsibility, and demonstrated in your application essay.
- A strong work ethic and leadership qualities (works part-time or has a compelling reason for not working), and demonstrated grit and resilience in the face of hardship.

All Upward Bound seniors with a 3.00 or higher GPA should apply for this very important scholarship! http://phillips-scholarship.org/

April 16th NHCF is the largest provider of publicly available scholarships in New Hampshire, awarding more than \$5.5 million to 1,500 promising students each year. 
Your College Financial Aid Award Letters!

As your Award Letters start rolling in please make copies and share them with us. We collect these every year to help you evaluate the letters to find your best deal, determine your eligibility for the Phillips Scholarship, and to get a sense of what schools are giving our students-which will help us make recommendations for next year's seniors and other Upward Bound students for years to come.

And so far, the Award Letters that we have seen are just about what we expected. Your hard work or lack of—in high school does pay off—we see it in every award letter. We also see students who have not identified realistic safety schools struggling to figure out how to afford all of those Dream Schools on their list!
